#### LORE LIXENBERG

Lore Lixenberg is a mezzo-soprano who also likes to make things with sound. Her work extends out of voice, into coding, radiophonic/acousmatic work and film according to the demands of the idea. Having studied with Mason, Powell and Vishnevskaya as a mezzo-soprano, she went on to apply operatic voice to physical-theatre with UK-based, leCoq trained, Theatre de Complicite and the revolutionary controversial comedy club, 'CLUUB ZARATHUSTRA', with Stewart Lee, Simon Munnery and Richard Thomas. Performing with ensembles and opera companies worldwide, she premiered many new works and created new roles written for her voice with composers such as Acquaviva, Aperghis, Fujikura, Hind, Niblock, Oliveros, Rønsholdt, Turnage and Wishart, recently making and performing the role of 'ELECTRICITET' with Hotel Pro Forma, directed by Kirsten Dehlholm and Marie Dahl.
